Think about your colleagues: Which ones are the most talented or provide the best 'out of box' solutions? Who is the 'go to person' with the most creative ideas? Chances are they are not the most popular, best dressed, or even the nicest of people. Yet, they are indispensable. Guess what...

You have students just like this, many of whom are "gifted." Yet, there is a tendency to look at students and focus more on their quirkiness and/or bad behavior than on their strengths/talents. Teaching would be less stressful if everyone were the same—learned the same, on the same level, and no problems of any kind—The Perfect World. Since that is not the case nor ever will be, a variety of teaching strategies are used for the variety of learning styles in the classroom. This can be tiring and quite frustrating when there are gifted students who think outside the box, ask a lot of questions, are unmotivated, have no regard of consequences, are disrespectful, underachieving, perfectionists, and delayed in social/emotional skills. We know these are characteristics most gifted students share and they tend to stand out and mask their true gifts/talents. We need to be superhero teachers to bring out, nurture, and develop these students' areas of giftedness/ talents, provide strategies for them to help with their quirks, behaviors, and feelings all while guiding them to greater achievements and success.

Someone, somewhere impacted your colleagues — the ones referred to earlier — in a way that lead them to where they are to-day. Maybe that colleague is you. Someone, somewhere saw your gift/talent and encouraged you to keep going, keep achieving, no matter what obstacles came your way. And, that is exactly what you need to do for your students. Recognize their gifts/talents and encourage them to keep striving/learning/achieving no matter what. Listen to what they are saying or not saying and make the necessary adjustments.

As you wrap up this year, know this: **You** are that superhero teacher. **You** are the encourager. **You** are the one adult your students look up to—they watch you, listen to what you say and do not say, and pick up on your frustrations as well as joys. **You are truly their Superhero Teacher.**
